My remembrance of Johnston Ave. There were three house on the left side going up and two on the right. I lived at 14 the Murdocks at 16 and Mrs Smith at 40. On the right side was a big house where the Bernsteins lived and the next house Mrs Holmes lived with her two sons. Mrs Smith's garage was across the street from her home. We played baseball on the vacant lot between 16 and 40. Home plate was near 40 and left field was at Murdocks house. Mr. Eisenburg lived at 410 Pleasant St. his backyard was in back of 14 where I lived,Mr Eisenburg complained to my mother that we were stealing his pears. Well the next night my brother and I went over the fence and ate the pears right on the tree and left the cores hanging on the tree. We had some great time on that street, sliding down Hosmer Mt.on card board boxes, in the summer and sleds in the winter. As kids we had the largest swimming pool in the city, Hosmer Mt. Reservoir. The city covered it years later. If the barn or garage on the berstein's property is still standing, he had a butcher shop there. During the war when meat was scarce Berstein did a landside business there. Nate Mandel also lived in Bernstein's house he owned Mandell's bakery on Elm St. He made the best jelly doughnuts around, to this day I can still taste them. To me that was the best little Ave. in the city. I have many fond memories of Johnston Ave when I was growing up. The kids today don't know how to play just sitting at a computer or watching the tube. If you think I missed anything let me know.
