Broad Street, which was to the west of Jackson, and parallel to Jackson was opposite the diner. To place the diner today you would go to the Jillson Museum and head west about 50 feet for the location. The next building to the west was Moe Rosen's Gas Station with parking between the two buildings. The Windham Grill became the Windham Diner in 1951 and was finally leveled in the early 1970's.

How does this issue work for, say, Mobile Homes? In that case the structure is owned by one and the land by another. Do both get separate property tax bills? I do not know...


